WATER TREATMENT: Please be advised that we are working on the Reverse Osmosis (RO) Coordination at the Water Treatment Plant. RO, is what purifies the town’s water, and components to remove the hard water. This is a continual work in process, and we appreciate your patience with us, as we continue to make improvements to the water system.

PREPARING FOR MOSQUITO SEASON: Because mosquitos are serious business. Please begin looking at anything that you own that is outside, and can hold water. It turns out that there are several relatively inexpensive steps anyone can take to **reduce mosquito** risks around the home.

- Look for standing water in and around your backyard.
- Drain or treat standing water.
- Use an aerosol or propane fogger to clear mosquito’s
- Treat shady areas around the house, especially around entry ways where resting mosquitoes are more likely to come indoors.

We have been adding to all sections but, at present, I’m lost in my favorite one, the Non Fiction Books. After talking with folks here, it’s clear we all like to read pretty much the same things...local authors and topics, old and new stories of Mountain Men, Historians, Cowboy and Indian true Wild West adventures.

On that note, allow me to recommend 3 books in a series by Richmond Hobson Jr. On my mental list they fall under “Absolutely Excellent and Exciting True Adventures”! Nothing Too Good For A Cowboy takes place in the late 20’s and early 30’s and recounts the founding of the Frontier Cattle Company in British Columbia. Rich came from the east and hung out around here for awhile learning to be a cowboy before he decided to team up with a couple of others and go north to look for good grazing land. “The life and death experiences of these men in conditions as killing as any encountered by the western frontier pioneers of a hundred years earlier...” Their willingness to endure brutally long hours, hard work and harsh environment day after day speaks to their depth of character. A story beyond imagination and one that could not be outdone in fiction. They cover about 30 years of the author’s life and I’d love to introduce you to them!
